## Foundations of LGBTQ-Inclusive Schools

This session provides tools for creating queer-inclusive and gender-expansive classrooms where LGBTQ+ youth - and by extension, all youth - can thrive. An Act Relative to Gender Identity, which became effective in 2012, protects students from discrimination based on gender identity, as well as sexual orientation. This workshop will provide a thorough introduction to the laws, policies, resources, and best practices for supporting LGBTQ+ students. It will emphasize strategies for improving school climate, particularly for students at the intersection of multiple marginalized identities. Participants will leave with strategies to immediately use.
